SATF EDUCATION SUPPORT TO MVC IN DODOMA REGION

SATF has continued with its efforts directed towards the provision of education support to Most Vulnerable Children (MVC) through Implementing Partners. In year 2010, The Fund allocated TZS55.4 mill to support 170 MVC from primary schools, 294 from secondary schools and 42 from Vocation Training Centers in Dodoma region, through her three Implementing partners namely: - TIKVAH HOMES, FPCT and HWG.

COMMUNITY EMPOWERMENT PROJECT IN IHUMWA-DODOMA REGION

SATF through TIKVAH Homes provided piglets and goats in form of loan to 30 MVC caregivers in Ihumwa Village Dodoma to enable them to support dependent MVC access basic needs such as education, food and nutrition, shelter, and health care. Further more SATF

provided funds for training on livestock husbandry.

After 11 Months of project implementation; two beneficiaries namely Grace Zachariah and Peris Manali, they have managed to pass two piglets each to newly beneficiaries namely Rebeca Matengwa and Jeni Makali indicating that the project is alive and will be sustainable after TIKVAH Homes handing over of the project to the community members.

FILLING EDUCATIONAL GAP FOR MVC IN IRINGA REGION!

GROWOYODA was awarded a grant of TZS. 10,819,000/= for year 2010 grant to support 63 Secondary Schools and 45 Primary School beneficiaries’ with scholastic materials in Njombe (Iringa Region) under SATF Education Program.

In November, 2010 SATF conducted monitoring visit in Njombe. During the visit SATF observed that beneficiaries are attending classes as usual and the performance was good for majorities. Beneficiaries also confirmed to have

received educational support. The visit was conducted at the period when form two students were doing national exams. Interviewed form two beneficiaries expressed that the exams were fair and they were looking forward to good results.

SATF team observed also that some beneficiaries’ had poor attendance due to family problems and others are heads of households. One beneficiary revealed that he missed school for some days as he was compelled to do a part time job in order to get money to buy food. Another challenge faced by majority of beneficiaries is the long distance from Schools to their homes. Some of them are required to walk for more than five kilometers from home to school, which also cause poor attendance and performance to some of them. There is still a long way to go and a need to call for joint efforts among different players in order to ensure MVC needs is met beyond educational support.
